#### 10. Other business from the floor

The floor was opened for members to ask any questions of the board. None were asked.

Peter Lindley provided an overview of an article he wrote about his experience as a patient in hospital with a hearing impairment. It called for awareness for all hospital staff and improved training for care providers to better understand the needs of hearing impaired patients in the hospital system.

Jess Sharp raised the awareness of the upcoming change in the National Relay Service resulting in the likely removal of CapTel services and its impact on CapTel users. A general discussion was had on ways to raise awareness of the issue as members present were concerned about the impact of its removal.

#### Post COVID-19 services:

- All services requiring face to face contact have had to cease which has been very difficult for everyone concerned.
- · Information and referral services have continued via the BHA office with staff working from home.
- All Advocacy has continued on line via Zoom and Teams meetings with captioning provided.

We were just starting to think we may be able to have staff back at work but with a new spike in infections, it is a wait and see what the future holds.

All members and our wider community will be kept in touch regarding the recommencement of our services.

## **Business Manager's Annual Report - 2020**


There's a lot been said about the year 2020 and it has certainly been an interesting one for BHA Brisbane. Like many organisations, the impact of Covid-19 has necessitated changing the way we work and adapting to the many challenges of delivering community-based services during a global pandemic. The difficult decisions of shutting down place-based support programs; transitioning our small team of dedicated staff to remote working arrangements; ceasing all volunteer-led activities; and placing on hold our community support groups have all had to be made. But the year has not been without its achievements and progress.

#### **Advocacy Support & Connection**

Despite the impact of Covid-19, our Advocacy, Support and Connection service was still able to reach over 900 consumers and deliver more than 1100 service outputs throughout the year.

The consumer service profile shows the provision of hearing loss related information continues to be our most sought-after service.

As always, we are grateful to the Queensland Government for its ongoing support.





### **Financial Viability**

In late 2019 BHA Brisbane made the bold decision to sell off its major asset and leave the West End property we have called home for the past 20 years. Securing much needed cash reserves and freeing up important investment potential ensures the organisation's financial viability as we continue to invest in service enhancements and alternative income streams.

Our new serviced office at 'The Bower' in Stones Corner now serves as the administrative centre with all place-based services being delivered in community settings.

#### **Mission and Strategy**

Partnering with consultancy firm, Nous Group last year saw us complete a comprehensive stakeholder engagement process that helped refine our strategic priorities. Being 'sustainably mission centred' was the driving theme behind a strong 'business to business' strategy to generate alternative income whilst continuing to deliver individual consumer support services.





#### **Business Support Services**



#### Workplace Education & Training

Repackaging our Workplace Education & Training program as part of a comprehensive suite of Business Support Services is a continuation of business capability enhancements already underway in 2019.



#### **E-Learning Training Modules**

Further enhancements to our Business Support Services include the development of online training programs. Following a successful 'Age Friendly Communities' grant received last year, BHA Brisbane has partnered with a number of organisations to develop an elearning training module to support customer facing roles in local council facilities to better meet the needs of older residents with hearing loss. The 'HEAR Here' workplace training project is on track to launch with the Redlands City Council in late 2020 with other local government authorities to follow in 2021.



This is a key initiative in BHA Brisbane's 'B2B' strategy with additional training modules already in development. We once again thank the Queensland Government for supporting this project.



#### Loop Me Hearing Augmentation Systems

'In the Loop', BHA Brisbane's hearing augmentation system design, sales and leasing service has also rebranded this year. Now known as 'Loop Me', this service operates as a commercial enterprise aimed primarily at supporting business, industry and government. Although heavily impacted by Covid-19 this year, Loop Me promotes best practise in accessible communication through the provision of permanent and temporary hearing augmentation solutions. A range of personal assistive listening equipment is also available for sale

A dedicated website for this stand-alone service has also been commissioned.

Despite the reduction in some service offerings and the challenges of operating in an increasingly 'remote world', BHA Brisbane has continued to play a strong advocacy role in the community. Advising state government authorities on accessible transport; providing consulting and project support to state-based health departments; and participating in the review of the Federal Health Department's Hearing Services Program are just some examples. I would like to personally acknowledge our volunteer consumer advocates whose contribution to these activities is invaluable.

Many of our partner organisations have also been heavily impacted by Covid-19 this year and we acknowledge their challenges along with our own and those of the consumers we have continued to support. Likewise, the members and volunteers who support our organisation, without whom we would not be able to do the work we do. Lastly, I would like to acknowledge BHA Brisbane's small but dedicated workforce and our volunteer board of directors, their unwavering commitment and support is much appreciated.

## **Treasurer's Annual Report - 2020**

In late 2019, BHA Brisbane sold the building in Vulture St, West End. This necessary step has released the cash locked up in the asset and has established a secure financial position for the foreseeable future and this is highlighted on the end of financial year 20 Balance Sheet.

Whilst achieving what we knew was necessary, it is not a cure all. We know that the Department of Community Services (DOCS) funding has now ceased and we will no longer generate a rental income from the apartment let out as part of the building. The rental income has been partially offset by interest earned but with historically low interest rates and the requirement to slowly draw down on these funds, the offset will be marginal and not an enduring prospect.

To highlight the effect of these changes, I have recently set the budget for this current financial year and it estimates a shortfall of almost \$75,000. Compare to the year prior, this is an increase of approximately \$30,000.

The next chapter of BHA Brisbane must be to continue the drive for financial independence through measured and properly executed initiatives. Whilst the major government contributor is still committed through to at least the end of June 2022, there is no guarantee of an extension from then. Should that eventuate and nothing else changes, it would simply accelerate the outgoings at a faster pace than currently predicted.

On a positive note, our short to mid-term prospects are positive. We are now in a position where we can use our favourable cash position to make the necessary steps to independence mentioned earlier. This will not be easy in an environment dominated by circumstances outside of our control. Donations will be more difficult to obtain and no doubt government bodies will be expected to play their part in reigning in the spend of the public purse.

Regardless, there is a critical need for the likes of organisations such as BHA Brisbane and I have no doubt, we will be here for the long term, providing services that benefit all our members and the community at large.

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#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Queensland 1981.

In the opinion of those charged with governance, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored to satisfy all their information needs.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not consider changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

#### a) Income tax

The association is exempt from payment of income tax in accordance with the provisions of Section 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1977.

#### b) Property

Values of property as recorded in the Balance Sheet are based on original cost or the committee's valuation. Where improvements or alterations have been made to a property subsequent to purchase the values shown may not have been amended for such improvements.

c) Revenue
Revenue from recurrent grants is recognised upon receipt and non-recurrent grants are recognised upon meeting the expenditure requirements specified in the agreements.

Membership revenue is recognised on a cash basis and is only recognised when a member accepts the invitation to become a member by paying their annual fees.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

As is common for organisations of this type it is not practicable for the association to maintain an effective system of internal control over fundraising receipts until their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, the financial report in relation to fundraising receipts was limited to amounts banked and recorded

#### d) Goods and Services Tax (GST)
